### Data Attribution

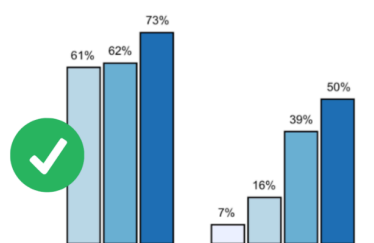

#### Aggregate statistics

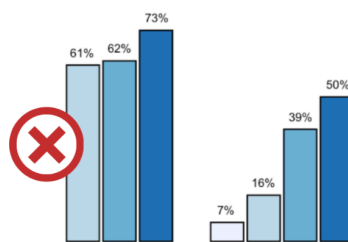
Over 600 anti-trans bills were considered across the United States in 2023, according to [Trans Legislation Tracker](#).
